Lazy Days Of June

June is a girl's name. It is also a month of the year. June, (the month not the girl) tends to be boring with not much happening except the warmer weather and the release of millions of school children from the confines of the classroom, free at last to roam in the summer sun.

A day by day run down of the month of June would put you to sleep. So here are some selected happenings that took place in June:

The first 11 days of June, although they bring sun and warm weather, have not exactly filled the history books with happenings.

Other June contributions, besides Flag Day and Father's Day are the Baseball Hall of Fame, dedicated on June 12, 1939; and the patenting of sandpaper on June 14, 1834.

June 15 holds two rare feats. The first was Ben Franklin's lightening demonstration in 1752; the day was highlighted 149 years later in 1901 by the inauguration of the Orthodontist Society Constitution. June 18 also holds record to two events. The first bicycle traffic court was established in 1934 and later in the day the U.S. Post Office issued the first stamp commemorating a living American by printing the Charles Lindbergh air mail stamp.

Another historical artifact didn't arrive until four days later on June 22 when the first machine to mass produce pins was patented in 1832. June 23, 1904 saw the first motorized boat race held in New York City. In 1951, on June 25, television history was made when viewers across the country witnessed the first ray of color shining on their screens, it was a soap commercial. June 26, 1847 the steam pile driver was patented. June 30, 1886, the last day of the month, saw the organization of the United States forest service.

On June 26, the day after gradauation, nine FHS German students will leave for Cologne, Germany. They will participate in school for 3½ weeks (six-day weeks). Following school, six of the students will leave for the Alps for two weeks with a youth organiza-

FHS Saves Memories

On Saturday, June 12, during the Bicentennial parade and festivities at Potter Memorial Park, a time capsule was presented that will be buried at the new canal park and dug up 100 years from its burial date. For the last three weeks, families residing in Fairport or Perinton were permitted to place one article weighing three ounces or less in the capsule.

The capsule will then be sealed on July 4, and stored until the Canal park is completed. The state has given

Fairport an Historical Marker and will dedicate the park as an Historical Site.

Hopefully the time capsule will be open on July 4, 2076 so the Fairport inhabitants of the future will learn what today's people were like and how we lived in our society.

The capsule approximately seven feet long, 34 inches high, and 34 inches wide. The walls are over three inches thick, and the entire capsule weights more than 2200 pounds.

GIVE and TAKE

With final exams inching painfully closer I decided to give everyone something to think about during the tests.

From the Hall Highlights newspaper of Hall High School in West Hartford, Connecticut comes some interesting ideas about

cheating.

In a poll of 100 students at Hall 91% of all the seniors have cheated, with 79% of the juniors and 88% of the sophomores also admitting to having cheated. Of these same students 87% of the females and 84% of the males have cheated. Overall 86% admitted to cheating and of this 86%, 64% do it rarely and 35% do it sometimes.

Here's some of the different responses Hall reporters got to their questions. Have you ever cheated? "What do you think I'm doing now." "How often do you cheat? "Only when my neighbor's answers are right." and "I cheat if the test is un-

fair."

The two most popular methods are writing the answers down and using teamwork, sometimes with codes. Written answers go in such places as pencils, eyeglass cases, belts, pants, shoes and even on bras. The other popular method of class teamword involves organization and cooperation. One student may distract the teacher while the others look up the answers in books or folders. Another favorite method of cheating is codes, utilizing sign languages, and coughing

In order to find the faculty's views, Hall reporters interviewed twelve members of the faculty. They expressed the opinion that cheating is the result of lowered values and the heavy competitiveness of our schools and society.

Of the 100 students polled 72% thought cheating was immoral, 39% were undecided and a surprisingly large group of 24% thought it moral. The teachers believed that the large percentage (24%) thinking cheating was moral came from seeing those they respect cheat in life, despite the old saying, "You are only hurting yourself," who cheat quite successfully.

But perhaps you do cheat and get caught, you not only flunk with a zero, you also flunk the course and maybe even high school. Most colleges won't accept you and many companies won't hire you. One small incident may deny you a chance at college, graduation and even employment.

And this is something else to consider, would you like to be operated on by a doctor who cheated his way through medical school or have your life and property defended or your laws made by a man who cheated through school and college? It could easily hap-

Recycling Center Pleads For Help

Recycling is one of the most desperately needed and beneficial of all ecological endeavors according to many ecologists. It is unfortunate, however, that the majority of people choose not to cooperate in this valuable program. It takes such little time and effort to save glass bottles and jars, cans and newspapers instead of wastefully discarding them.

The Recycling Center in Fairport needs your support. The center is located on Main Street in the Village behind Gypsum Services Corporation (on the left, just before you cross the railroad tracks going towards Penfield). It is run by the Perinton Greenlands Association, a non-profit organization devoted to ecological endeavors.

All proceeds from the recycling Center are used to support the organization's ecology work and also in sending young children to summer

The center accepts all kinds of glass bottles, newspapers, magazines and cardboard (cans must be taken to the American Can Company at 111 Parce Avenue, also in the village).

It is important that all metal caps and rings be removed from the bottles and that all cans, bottles and jars be rinsed out. Newspapers must be tied into bundles or placed in paper bags or cardboard boxes and put in the shed provided at the center.

The Perinton Greenlands Association urges everyone to tell their friends about the center and persuade them to contribute their recyclable materials. They suggest that if neighbors take turns taking each other's material to the center each family would make the trip less often.


